CARE OF BABY DURING THE INITIAL FEW HOURS AFTER BIRTH Weight record of the Baby: The baby should be weighed after stabilization and the temperature is documented to be normal. A sterile preheated sheet (or a single use paper towel) should be placed on 5 to 10 gm sensitivity weighing machine. Zeroing of the machine should be performed. The baby is then

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### *CARE OF NORMAL NEWBORN*

Routine Infant Care and Observation Neonates can be bathed (if the parents wish) once their temperature has stabilized at 37 ° C for 2 hours. The umbilical cord clamp can be removed when the cord appears dry, usually at 24 hours. Umbilical cord care is aimed at reducing the risk of umbilical infection (omphalitis).

Dry the infant in a warm towel then transfer the infant to a second warm, dry towel. This will prevent hypothermia caused by evaporation after delivery.

Routine assessment and care can be performed while the infant is on the mother's abdomen and breastfeeding can begin, if the mother wishes and the mother and infant are stable. Dry the wet infant quickly with warm towels to prevent heat loss by evaporation.

There have been no problems with the infant since delivery. Normal infants are at low risk of developing problems in the newborn period and, therefore, require primary care only. About 80% of all newborn infants are normal. Normal newborn infants are at low risk of developing problems and require only primary care.

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### *Primary Newborn Care: 2. Care of normal infants*

Care of all newborns includes immediate and thorough drying, skin to skin contact of the newborn with the mother, cord clamping and cutting after the first minutes after birth, early initiation of breastfeeding, and exclusive breastfeeding.

### *WHO | Newborn care at birth*

Definition of neonatal period: A period from birth 4 weeks postnatal. After the initial observation for neonatal condition requiring immediate intervention, the baby is sent to the normal newborn nursery or maternity floor for the purpose of follow up and stabilization.

Infants with severe hypoglycemia may need intravenous feedings to provide glucose rapidly. A normal temperature for a newborn is 36.5° to 37.5° C (97.7° to 99.5° F). Mild jaundice at 32 hours of age is physiologic jaundice and does not need an action by the nurse, just further monitoring.
