The mini-lesson is a period of direct and explicit instruction. Teach only one literacy objective and be explicit in explaining how learning this teaching point will help your children as readers. Use a gradual release model, in which you first demonstrate the teaching point and then give the children guided practice.

In last week's post, I described what reading workshop is and how it can be modified to work in primary classrooms. Today I'm going to go more in-depth on an essential component of reading workshop: the minilesson. In today's post, I'll discuss the structure of a minilesson and how to figure out what to teach in your minilessons (in the context of reading workshop).

What Is a Reading Workshop Minilesson? - Learning at the ...

Mini-Lesson: The Have-a-Go During some mini-lessons, we might ask students to take a few minutes (2-4 minutes) to try out the work we've just taught them. This is where the students get practice with the strategy you have taught. During the teaching demonstration, you modeled the new skill or strategy.

The mini lesson should be a reading skill you want your students to apply while reading the selection for guided reading. For example, your mini lesson might be characterization. You could model using part of the current story or another story. Using sticky notes, mark passages that reveal traits about a certain character.

If there are five guided reading ability groups in the classroom, the teacher can expect to read with each group approximately every other day, for a minimum of twice per week. This is usually done on a rota basis. While the teacher reads with a group, the other groups can be engaged in other reading activities suitable for their level.

How to teach guided reading (With activities) — Literacy Ideas

A mini-lesson at the beginning of Independent Reading is "a time to learn something specific about reading." Morgan et al., p. 17. This short (5-15 minute) dose of explicit instruction helps children practice applying appropriate strategies to books they enjoy when they go off to read.

When I meet with my guided reading groups, we read books, magazines, or passages depending on the strategy/skill we are focusing on. I follow these basic steps with each guided reading lesson: Review previous day's reading or introduce a new book. Go over 3-4 tricky vocabulary words. Set a focus for today's reading.

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Mini lessons can also be used to fill up a small pocket of extra time. Although the specifics of a mini lesson vary, many education experts agree that a mini lesson should last no more than ten to fifteen minutes, and should contain four basic components, called "connection," "teaching," "active engagement," and "link."
