This is known as “ hijab of the eyes ”. Then in the next verse, Allah commands the Prophet to address the women:

Verse 59 of chapter 33 quoted previously gives a very good reason; it says, “ This is more appropriate so that they may be known [as Muslim women] and thus not be harassed [or molested]. ”
