Take Home Exams: Tell It Like It Is. Take-home exams can be a very effective tool for assessing students' learning, but also present some challenges in ensuring equity for those taking them. The format gives students more time and flexibility to complete an advanced or complex assignment, perhaps with more resources, than they would have in a seated final exam.

Guidance on take-home examinations

Fixed-scheduled take-home exams must be taken on the day scheduled by the Office of Academic Services. Upper-class exams are no less than 4 hours and no more than 8 hours long. 1L exams are not longer than 8 hours. Upper-level exams will be scheduled for a window of time with one hour of flexibility.

In an unrestricted exam, there is no limit on what can be brought into the exam room or take-home test. Make sure you know if your exam is restricted or unrestricted before taking the test. Memorization is largely unnecessary for an open book exam. However, this does not mean you do not need to study.
